These awards recognize excellence and innovation within our industry, honouring those who have demonstrated outstanding commitment and achievement.


LOOKING AHEAD: TMAA NATIONAL CONFERENCE 2024

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For the past 12 years, Peter Frazer OAM has been committed to ensuring "Everyone gets home safe to their loved ones every day no exceptions!". Following the completely avoidable and tragic death of his 23 year old daughter Sarah Frazer, Peter created Safer Australian Roads And Highways (SARAH), and as you may be aware, subsequently created and leads what is now Australia's most important road safety event, National Road Safety Week. He is also responsible for creating Australia's road safety symbol, the Yellow Ribbon.

He is a leading global advocate for road workers, and a national leader specifically promoting the safety of our traffic controllers and their families.

As the TMAA is a proud partner of his organisation, we thought we would share a letter he wrote for his daughter on Sarah's 12th Anniversary.

While his letter is just written as a grieving Dad, it allows an important insight into how our TC's, their families, friends and loved ones, are affected by road tragedy. It also gives an insight into why the TMAA wants every person who uses our roads and highways, to look actively after all those on the road ahead ... or as Peter would say... to commit to "#Drive So Others Survive!".



A letter to Sarah on her 12th Anniversary



My darling Sarah

Valentine's Day used to be a very happy time for your mother and I, but now as that day approaches, I am overcome with sadness... haunted by the fact that it means that there is only one day left before your next anniversary.

Last night, I remembered back to Valentine's Day 2012 ... that night you were still packing your bag in preparation for your journey the following day ... You were so excited that the next week, you would be starting your Photography Degree at Charles Sturt University but you told us that you still had so much to do before your plan to leave midmorning on your drive to Wagga Wagga.

You said how starting Uni was the culmination of all you had worked for ... you were so eager to be on your way and with your "essentials" already packed (ie. your camera, photographic gear and portfolio) ... you wanted to get on with it so you could make a difference in the world. I remember thinking that night that you already had made such a difference with your dedication to others, whether through your work at school with St Vincent De Paul, or your volunteer work overseas with poor kids in the third world.

Anyway, that night I had called you down for dinner a number of times and you would irritably reply "I'll be down soon!". I was starting to get snippy for while it was only a simple meal that I had prepared, it would be our last meal until you were back home in a couple of months' time. When you finally came downstairs, I remember Mangya (Grandma's nickname), Mum and I sitting with you... we would laugh together as we ate dinner and yet there was a touch of melancholy in sharing that simple meal, because over the previous five years, I felt that you had been away far too much as you back-packed around the world, working where you could, and building that portfolio that you so treasured but never shared with us...

We were halfway through dinner when I poured us all some sparkling wine, and as I always do at dinner, I said we had to make a toast. With that I held up my glass and said:

"Here's to you Sarah, and the start of your new life".

How could I have known that in just 16 hours' time, your life would be taken by a distracted truck driver. How could I have possibly known that as time ticked by that night, it was really a countdown that would take you away from us forever.

The next morning (15 February 2012), I would say goodbye to you, not knowing that this would be the very last time I would ever hug you... ever kiss your beautiful face. It was around 7:45 am when I drove off, never realising you had less than 300 minutes to live.

Before you left home for the last time, with the car packed to the gunnels with everything you needed to begin your new life 450 kilometres away, you're rinsed off your car and then posted your last Facebook comment saying:

"I've just washed the bird poop off my car, I hope this is a good omen!"

But it wasn't ... because a little over 90 minutes into your journey, your car would breakdown on the Hume Freeway because your radiator had failed... you did the right thing and pulled over into the emergency lane but while Roads and Maritime Services had built that road with three lanes in each direction, and had set the speed limit at 110 kph, it had not built the emergency lane to Australian standards and had left it as only 1.5 metres wide. So not only was your vehicle left hanging into a high speed lane, to make matters worse, there was a crash barrier beside the Freeway that ran for 1600 metres, and because there were brambles and thorny bushes that prevented you from getting yourself off the road, you were left in harm's way.

This was completely foreseeable by the road designers and builders, but they had given priority to the movement of vehicles, and not to the safety of vulnerable people.

I was in a Managers' Meeting when you left me a panicked voicemail but because my phone was off, I never got that message until after 12:30 pm when we broke for lunch. I had never shared that message but back in 2018, I was asked to write the Foreword for the "Inquiry Into the National Road Safety Strategy 2011-2020", and for the first time I shared your words to me. Here is a little of my quote from the Foreword.

"It was around 11:15am when she left me a voicemail that will haunt me for the rest of my life. She said that as her car had lost power, she pulled over close to the guardrail but couldn't get her vehicle out of the high speed lane. She was crying when she said that as there were brambles on the other side of the guardrail, she couldn't physically get herself off the road either. She was trapped.

I will never forget these words.

'Cars and trucks are speeding past just centimetres away from my car... No one is changing lanes away from me ... I am terrified that they will hit me. I rang the NRMA. Dad, please call me!'

As I was at work, my mobile was off, so I didn't get the voicemail until after 12:30pm. Hearing her message, I went into a state of panic. I dialled her mobile but she didn't answer. I kept dialling but it just kept going to her voicemail.

My beautiful daughter was the kindest, funniest, most intelligent person I had ever met. She had everything to live for. But at 12:32pm, Sarah and the tow truck driver who had come to assist, were horrifically killed when a passing truck crashed into them. She was now left in pieces on Australia's most important road... ... Sarah's loved ones will grieve for the rest of their lives."

Your words ring in my ears, every day my Darling, and I sometimes have difficulty sleeping. This was especially true last night. Mum and I ended up going to bed around 1:00 am but I found it very hard to sleep and indeed I woke at 5:30 this morning... I stayed in bed but vivid memories of you prevented me from falling back to sleep so I got up 15 minutes later. I went downstairs and sitting in silence, remembered how 12 years ago on this very day, I could still hold you... Now I just speak to you in the quiet of the morning, or as I sit by myself in the dark of night.

I often speak of you to others and when I tell them about you, I mention how devoted you were to looking after others and especially those who were vulnerable... I talk about your volunteer work with the elderly, and with little children, for in reality, that was what you dedicated your short life to... I proudly tell them how you would challenge those who took others for granted... most of all, I loved your commitment to seeking justice for those society didn't give priority to.

In an incredibly profound way Sassy, you changed my life... You showed me how to be a better person... And while road safety was never your gig, looking after those who were vulnerable absolutely was ... and my darling you are now the inspiration for everything I do.

Thank you for the short time we had together in our family ... Without you, I will always be heartbroken...

I love you... I miss you... and I will forever hold you gently in my heart. Dad xox

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




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TMAA SA CHAIR'S REPORT

Another Christmas and New Years period has come and gone. Who can believe we are into February 2024 already! We trust that all of our hard working staff had a fantastic break and were able to rest up and spend some quality time with their loved ones.

The last quarter in Adelaide is traditionally the kick off to the Adelaide events season. Commencing with many local Christmas Pageants in November and December and moving through to premier events such as the Valo 500 and the Tour Down Under and then onto 'Mad March' which showcases some fantastic Fringe performances right across the city. Traffic Management plays a pivotal role in providing safe spaces for event organisers to bump in, bump out and conduct their events. Event traffic management is a niche area that allows the community to come together to celebrate and have fun.

After the 'spell' at Christmas, many of the civil constructors have returned to work to continue projects and to commence new ones. Recently the Majors Road project commenced vegetation removal in preparation for the construction of the additional on/off ramps for the Southern Expressway. Once complete, these ramps will allow easier access to the corridor for residents living in the surrounding suburbs.

Other projects will commence throughout the year in preparation for the start of the T2D tunnelling project. Intersection upgrades and rail separation projects will occur

in the Southern suburbs of Adelaide to prepare for the higher volumes of traffic that will undoubtedly be diverted away from the South Road corridor while the T2D project is in full swing come 2025 (and beyond)

February 1st was an important date for traffic management here in South Australia. This was the day when the new Austroads training program was officially rolled out. The 'good ole' Workzone Traffic Management Ticket is no longer, being replaced by the new Austroads 'tiered' system of training. Currently we have six RTO's registered to provide the training. There is an 18 month transition period whereby the current WZTM ticket will no longer be valid for use after August 2025 (unless they expire earlier.

At our recent TMAA meeting Eugenio Bria provided members with vital information regarding the 'recognition of prior learning' program associated with the Austroads training. There seems to be a fair amount of work required to follow the path of proving the prior learning.

Overall we believe the long term benefits of the new training protocols will far outweigh the short term pain <u>associated with the transition</u>.

Coming up at our next (breakfast) meeting we are honoured to have Jon Whelan, Chief Executive for DIT as our guest speaker. It is always great to listen to Jon's insights and thoughts about the current state of affairs as well as what the future holds from a 'Department' point of view.

Also on the horizon is our next Traffic Management Forum presented by the Safety Influencers Traffic Management Working Group. Topics that will be presented/discussed are TMA use and expectations, Traffic Controller behaviour, setting up and packing up temporary traffic management and presentations regarding Austroads updates and South Australia's Traffic Management Centre.

An update on the National Harmonisation of Temporary Traffic Management Practice

New Year is often a time to look back at the year that was and make resolutions for the year ahead on ways to improve.

Looking back at 2023, it was a terrible time for some in the temporary traffic industry. While it wasn't widely reported as other road crashes, traffic workers were struck in many parts of Australia, with some losing their lives.

The resolution for 2024 is to work to the nationally consistent adoption of the <u>Austroads Guide to</u> <u>Temporary Traffic Management (AGTTM)</u> all around Australia.

Austroads, the association of Australian and New Zealand government road and transport agencies, continues to work with members, local government, and industry to harmonise temporary traffic management practice. There are two key reasons for adopting the improved nationally consistent practice for temporary traffic management:

- It improves the likelihood that road workers will be safe - every employer has a responsibility to protect their workers.
- National consistency will help drive efficiency, for example, successful completion of the training requirements in one state/territory will be recognised in another participating state/territory.

Since the release of the AGTTM in late 2019, Austroads has worked with the temporary traffic management industry, state and territory governments and the training sector. While implementing changes can sometimes be challenging and slower than hoped, the industry under the leadership of Andrew White and Matt Bereni is helping us make progress. Austroads National Temporary Traffic Management Operations Manager Patsy Thomas has continued to listen to industry to shape implementation to address issues as they arise.

Looking back at 2023, it was a terrible time for some in the temporary traffic industry. While it wasn't widely reported as other road crashes, traffic workers were struck in many parts of Australia, with some losing their lives.

APPROVED TRAINING PROVIDERS

Under the national training framework for TTM the <u>Registered</u> <u>Training Organisation (RTO) framework</u> detailing the process for an RTO to become an Approved Training Provider (ATP) to deliver temporary traffic management training, the oversight and audit mechanisms and renewal/termination was finalised.

Since the last edition of Detours, several RTOs have successfully become ATPs. The list of ATPs grows each week. I congratulate all of those training organisations for their commitment to improve road worker safety.

Only ATPs can deliver the Skill Sets in the Temporary Traffic Management National Training Programs. New employees to temporary traffic management (in a participating jurisdiction) must complete their training in one or more of Temporary Traffic Management National Training Programs with an ATP.

AUSTROADS INNOVATIVE TEMPORARY TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT DEVICE AND SOLUTION ASSESSMENT

The Austroads Innovative Temporary Traffic Management Device and Solution Assessment (AITDSA) Scheme provides a way for innovative devices and solutions used for temporary traffic management to be assessed and recommended for use in Australia and New Zealand.

AITDSA responds to the emergence of new technologies, innovative solutions and devices that can be used to improve safety at work sites.

A total of six innovative temporary traffic management (TTM) devices and solutions have been recommended for use by AITDSA, with others currently being assessed.

Most recent AITDSA approval was made at the December 2023 AITDSA Panel meeting recommending for use a solar-powered, motorised boom gate SentriGate. The device can be remotely controlled by traffic controllers. In the event of an impact, the SentriGate's boom arm swings away, minimising potential impacts to road users.

Major traffic changes have been put in place as part of the construction of Tasmania's largest ever transport infrastructure project, the Bridgewater Bridge.

The \$786 million bridge, which will replace the existing bridge with a four-lane, 80kph span across the Derwent River, features grade-separated interchanges at each end for a seamless connection for vehicles in both directions.

In mid-December, major traffic changes occurred on the southern side at Granton so construction can progress safely.

A new temporary roundabout was established on the Brooker Highway and all through traffic has now switched onto the new Lyell Highway alignment.

A section of Black Snake Road is closed, and Main Road traffic will be temporarily directed along George Street for about three months to travel north or south on the Brooker Highway.

There will be safe pedestrian access and access to properties across the project site at all times.

In early 2024, all Midland Highway northbound traffic in Bridgewater will be diverted along Old Main Road, while southbound traffic will remain on the existing highway.

Minister for Infrastructure and Transport, Michael Ferguson, said major construction had gained momentum after the completion of the temporary bridge, allowing construction to continue without impacting traffic.

"The original construction schedule remains on time to be completed in mid-2025," the Minister said.

"While opening the bridge to one lane of traffic in each direction at 60kph by the end of 2024 was the initial target, I am advised by project management that they can complete the job more efficiently, with less risk to worker safety and open to all four lanes of traffic at 80kph within the overall due date.

The \$786 million bridge, which will replace the existing bridge with a four-lane, 80kph span across the Derwent River, features grade-separated interchanges at each end for a seamless connection for vehicles in both directions.

"Maximising local industry participation in the project has been a priority, but this has meant it has taken longer than expected to ramp up to peak production.

"Planning work started back in 2019, so to finish this project within months of the forecast date will be a significant achievement considering the challenges across the building and construction industry."

"Last week I visited the New Bridgewater Bridge project site and was thoroughly impressed with the rate at which the new bridge is taking shape," Mr Ferguson said.

"Anyone who has driven through the area recently would have seen the hive of activity taking place across the project site.

"From the crews working nonstop to produce more than 1,000 concrete bridge segments, to the teams making sure people can travel safely through the site, everyone is working hard to get this project finished." Across the project site, 14 of the 42 bridge piers have been poured and more than 190,000 cubic metres of earth moved.

Crews are working hard to complete both bridge abutments, with all land piers completed and segments being lifted into place.

Works are continuing to ramp up at the project's purpose-built pre-cast concrete production facility with 97 of the 1,082 concrete bridge segments complete and being delivered to site.

At peak production the facility will produce up to five segments each day and employ about 90 people.

The project is supporting more than 1,000 direct and indirect jobs as well as upskilling Tasmanian workers.

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New National Network Map to make heavy vehicle routing more efficient

In December, the National Heavy Vehicle Regulator (NHVR) reached a major milestone with the release of our National Network Map.

The new map marks the first-time operators can view where they can travel and where they need to seek access approval, on a national level.

Available through the NHVR Portal, it also creates a single-entry point for industry to access their heavy vehicle related information.

The National Network Map is just one of the ways we are transforming the NHVR Portal into a heavy vehicle business centre.

We will see it become the central and authoritative location for the trucking industry to map journeys across state and territory borders for their entire fleet.

The transition of each state and territory map onto the NHVR Portal to create the National Network Map began in December 2022, and it has been an incredible effort to reach this achievement.

This includes 54 networks in South Australia, 111 networks in Victoria, six networks in Queensland, 67 networks in New South Wales and six networks in Australian Capital Territory.

The new map means industry can access more comprehensive and consistent routing data, creating a more efficient routing experience.

In turn, this will reduce the number of permit applications required, and enable a quicker turnaround for approvals.

Since the map's launch on 20 December, it has been accessed more than 17,000 times by users across Australia.

We look forward to seeing this figure grow as more drivers and companies begin using the map to route journeys for their entire fleet. But the benefits of the map are not limited to industry, with positive outcomes for government as well.

Road managers are given access to a self-service tool to manage gazetted networks, and have the enhanced ability to manage disruption and publish safe updates to their networks.

This means during disasters - including floods, bushfires or significant accidents - updates can be shared in real-time.

The National Network Map will be linked to a national network of road ownership providing better data, which will mean fewer delays in permitting and better decisions regarding network access.

It's been an ongoing journey to get to this stage, and I'm thrilled the NHVR is delivering technology upgrades to help equip truck drivers across Australia with more efficient routing options.

Over the next six months, the NHVR will continue to work on digitalising all maps associated with pre-approvals, as well as working with local government road managers to develop faster approvals for these pre-approval maps.

Case Study: SA Power Networks: POSITIVE INTENT: How in-vehicle data, driver education and industry partnerships built a strong road safety culture

Synopsis

SA Power Networks faces a multitude of safety risks, ranging from risks for specific items of equipment to general risks associated with supplying power. This was reflected in its approach to maximising workplace road safety performance, from identifying and acting on individual risks to building a positive safety culture. Rather than 'reinventing the wheel', the organisation adapted proven approaches to meet its own challenges.

Introduction

SA Power Networks' fleet travels 20 million kilometres each year to provide and maintain power supply across South Australia. It has the largest non-Government fleet in the State, and that fleet varies widely from passenger and light commercial vehicles to fit-for-purpose equipment like EWPs (elevated work platforms).

Its people often work over long distances and varied terrain, from urban settings to regional and rural areas, including off-road locations. Add the unpredictability of requiring access to private land to complete its operations, and the list of workplace road safety risks SA Power Networks has to manage is extensive.

So where did the organisation start? Like many, with data.

And why? To understand what was actually happening in its organisation and where action was needed.

Data has been the driving force behind preventing incidents, acting as a leading indicator for where driver education and management focus is required, and informing what training is provided and who to.

The approach has proven so effective, the organisation has significantly cut both the number and severity of driver-at-fault incidents, expanding its successful approach beyond driving to all transport risks.

This case study will highlight SA Power Networks' journey to a strong workplace road safety culture, the critical role data and in-vehicle monitoring plays in each facet of its approach, and how benefiting from the experience of others has helped it create effective and tailored measures without needing to 'reinvent the wheel'.
